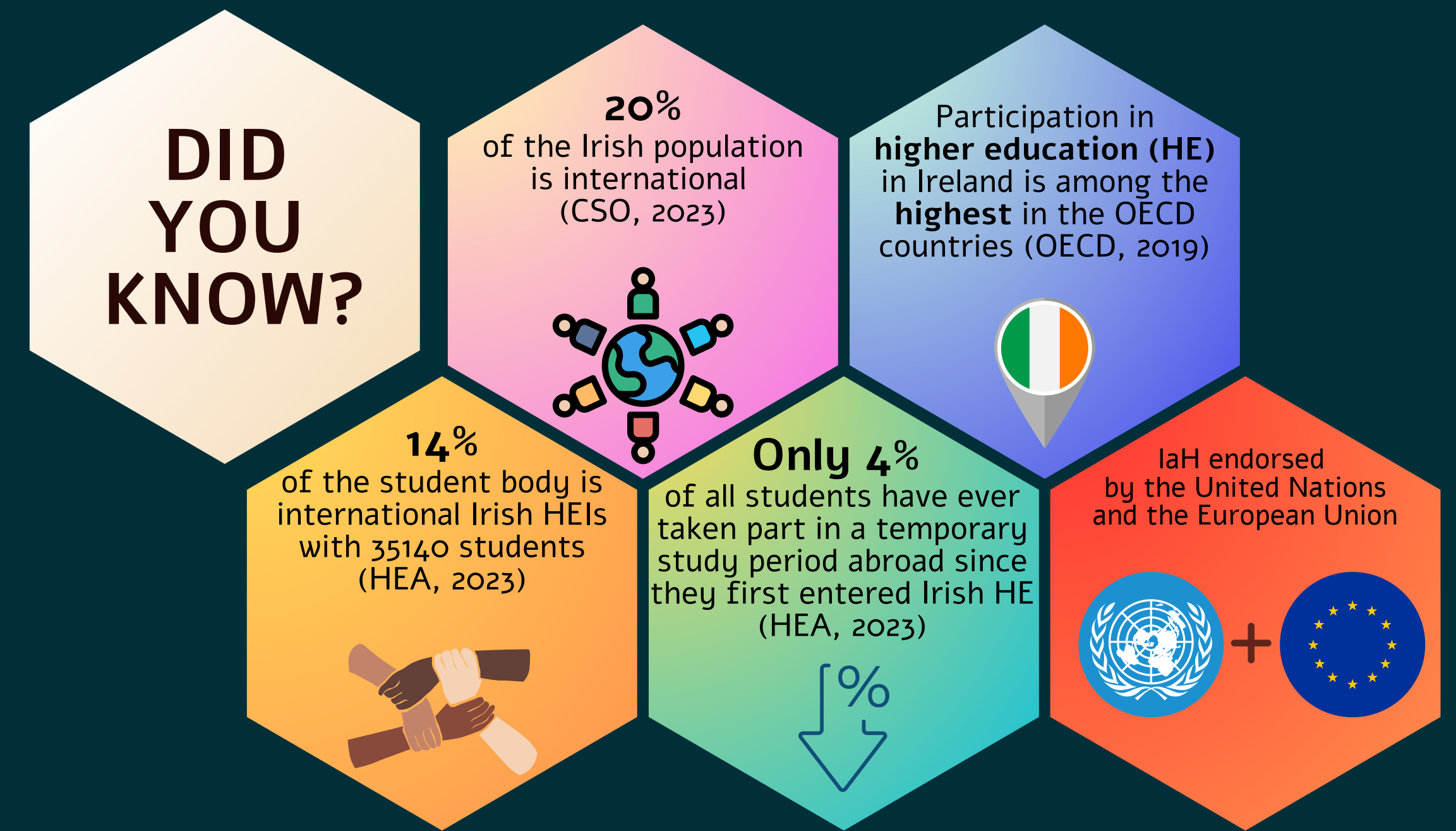
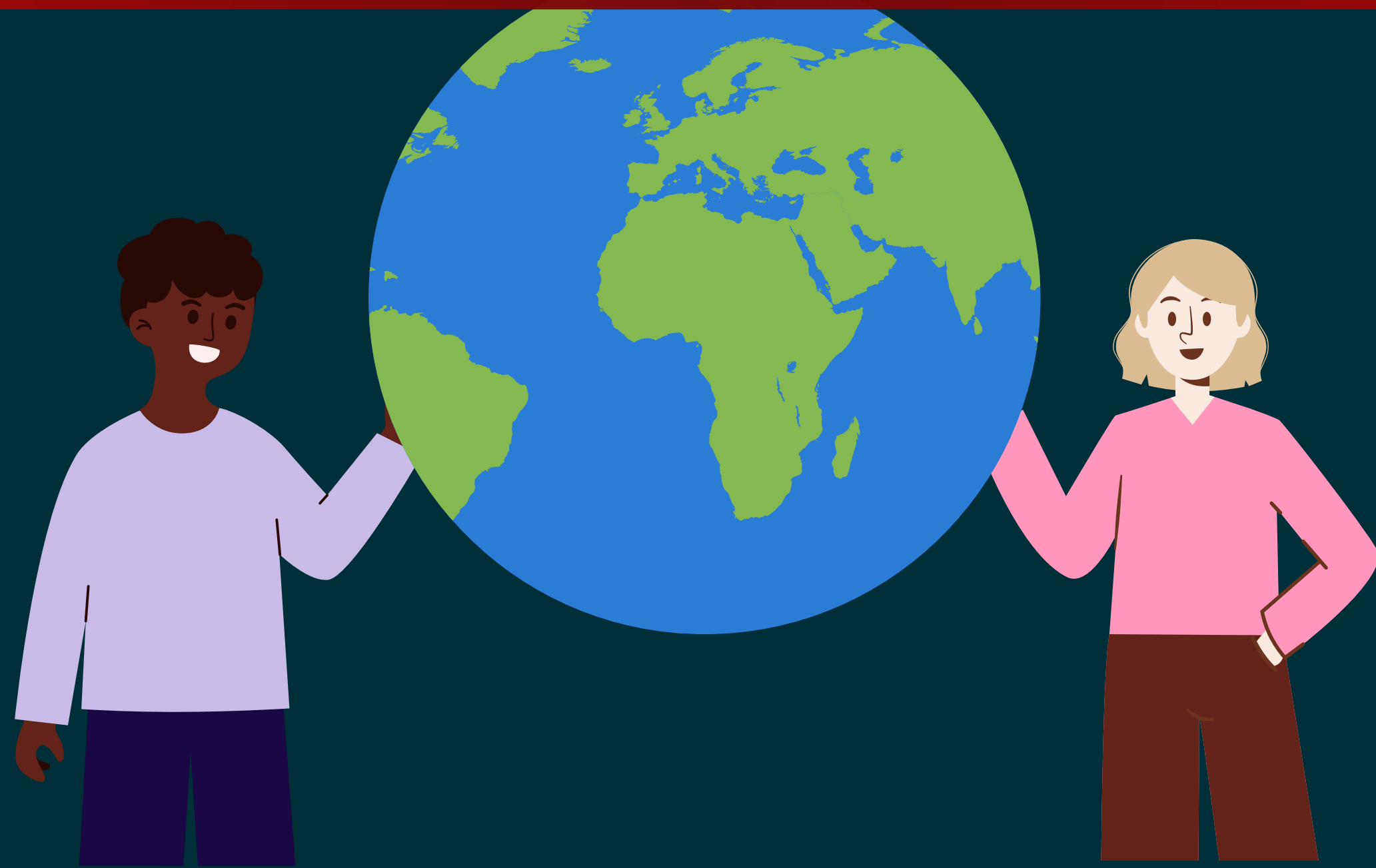
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What is Internationalisation at Home (IaH)?

IaH is 'the purposeful integration of international and intercultural dimensions into the formal and informal curriculum for all students within domestic learning environments' (Beelen & Jones, 2015, p.69).

IaH seeks to provide international and intercultural learning to most students at their home institution who cannot take advantage the mobility opportunities due to socio-economic, physical, or personal circumstances or a lack of interest or awareness about IaH.
